



Young adult hair styles show originality and pride of appearance

Some of you would like to wear your hair in a certain way but you don't dare, because it's not what is accepted. Well, President Madison was a cat who dared to dislike conformity, and was under constant fire of the conformists.

The following is an anecdote from the book "Life of Dolly Madison" by Mrs. Wilder Goodman: "The country is doomed; what presidents we might have, sir! Just look at Dagget of Connecticut, or Stockton of New Jersey! What queues they have got sir! as big as your fist and powdered everyday, sir, like the real gentlemen they are. Such men, sir, would confer dignity upon the Chief Magistracy; but this little Jim Madison, with a queue, no bigger than a pipe-stem! Sir, it is enough to make a man forswear his country." I might mention here that, the "kick" of powdering mens hair went out of style in 1794.

President Jefferson began his administration with an effort to set aside conventionality in dress and *shocked* the Federalist party by a certain ill-timed exhibition of his democratic ideas. We are told by an eye witness of his first inauguration, March 1801, that "he made no preparation for the ceremony as far as his appearance was concerned. His indifference was ostentatious and evidently intended to cause comment. He wore a blue coat, a thick drab-coloured waistcoat with red underwaistcoat lapped over it, green velveteen breeches with pearl buttons, yarn stockings, and slippers.

That doesn't really sound bad when you consider what the most fashionable young man wore in 1801. Here's a quote from an 1801 issue of "Port Folio": "All our young men of fashion wear frocks of dark blue, dark green, or dark brown cloth, with convex metal buttons, round hats with broad brims, short breeches and white stockings, or pantaloons with Hessian boots."

Beau Brummell is accredited with the revival of taste in dress among gentlemen which had been conspicuously lacking at the end of the eighteenth century. His first innovation was the

arrangements of neck-cloths. "His collars were always fixed to his shirt and so large that before folded down they completely hid his face and head; the neck-cloth was almost a foot in height; the collar was fastened down to it's proper size."

How to give a Ducktail Haircut . . .



1. Jim Morrison is the victim. He wore his hair straight back on both sides with a wave in front. Above is 'before.'




2. The first step is to comb all hair forward toward the center and comb down on all sides like the above photo.



3. Next is to trim sides just like normal hair trim. Leave sides full so that it can be combed back to form ducktail.

5. Next apply Contour Wax or Butch Wax to hair. This makes hair stand straight up. Makes cutting hair flat, easy.



6. Sides are finished, now Jack starts cutting the top so that it will be flat. Keep comb level and run clipper over.




7. Jack advises barbers not to use "butch clipper attachment" because it will not cut absolutely flat on top.


4. Square off back of hair. Straight line across bottom of hair is to be cut ½ inch below the ear lobe. Shave later.

Long on the side, top combed up-and-over coming down forward to fall loose near forehead. Back can be worn in a ducktail or regular trim. Hair stays neat all day long.

Not a new style, but one that is very popular with girls that have hair long enough. Beautiful girl isn't she?








